

Your SoNAR registration includes a truly “monumental” tour of Washington, D.C.

Leaving directly from the conference hotel, the 4-hour bus tour, sponsored by Target, will take conference attendees down Pennsylvania Avenue, past the United States Capitol building and the White House and on to the major attractions of Washington D.C. Each bus will have a guide that will explain the history behind these sites and you will have the opportunity to disembark and get a close view of each. Included in the tour will be:

**The World War II Memorial** – Washington’s newest memorial, dedicated in May 2004, is located on the National Mall at the Eastern end of the Reflecting Pool between the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument. The World War II Memorial honors the 16 million Americans who served in the United States Military along with more than 400,000 who lost their lives fighting for their country.

**The Jefferson Memorial** - The Jefferson Memorial is located in West Potomac Park on the South Bank of the Tidal Basin. The Memorial is dedicated to our third President, Thomas Jefferson, who is known for his contributions to the Declaration of Independence and help in negotiating the Louisiana Purchase.



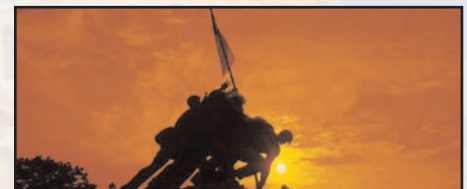
**The Lincoln Memorial** - The memorial was built to honor our 16th President, Abraham Lincoln, and a country that withstood a civil war and was able to create a truly free, democratic society for all people regardless of skin color. This memorial was the combined vision of 3 men and took nine years to complete. The Lincoln Memorial is truly an inspiring monument that celebrates our ability as Americans to overcome obstacles towards democracy and freedom.



**The FDR Memorial** - The Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial was dedicated on May 2, 1997. Sculptures depict 12 years of history regarding the United States during Roosevelt’s four terms in office, including the Great Depression and his “fireside chats.”

**The Vietnam Memorial** - The Vietnam Memorial was created with 3 separate parts that include The Wall, the Three Soldiers Statue depicting a White American, Black American and Hispanic soldier, and the Vietnam Woman’s Memorial dedicated to the women who served during the war. The Wall was designed by Maya Ying Lin and is made of two black granite walls that are 246 feet long and stand 10 feet high; each wall has 72 panels. A book is located at each end of the memorial to help visitors find specific names on The Wall.

**The Iwo Jima Memorial** - On February 23, 1945 during the Battle of Iwo Jima, Joe Rosenthal took a Pulitzer Prize-winning photograph called the “Raising of the Flag on Iwo Jima.” This memorial depicts that moment in bronze. On June 12, 1961, President John F. Kennedy proclaimed that an American flag should fly 24 hours a day on the statue’s 60-foot flagpole. The Iwo Jima Memorial is dedicated to the 6,841 men who died during the battle.



**The Korean Memorial** – Dedicated on July 27, 1995, the Korean Memorial is in the shape of a triangle intersecting a circle. In the circle are 19 stainless steel statues of the squads on patrol; they include 15 Army men, 2 Marines, 1 Navy Medic and 1 Air Force officer. In the middle of the circle is the Pool of Remembrance, lined with black granite and surrounded by trees and benches.
